As you will see on the following pages of this Annual Report, the Jacksonville Region has had another good year! The Region gained 520 new jobs in 2015. The annual unemployment rate for Morgan County was 5.5% and for Scott County it was 6.8%, the lowest it's been since 2007.

One of the largest gains in employment this past year came from Computer Sciences Corporation (CSC), a business services center, located in Jacksonville. They have added 200 plus new employees this past year. Other new and growing businesses in our Region include CCK Automations, Westermeyer Industries, Alsey Refractories, Envirovac, Pallet Repair Systems (PRS) the Maschhoffs, Cedarhurst, Safeco, Helena Chemical and TA Terminals.

Congratulations and thank you for investing in the Jacksonville Region.

We also responded to twelve requests for proposals from "unknown" prospects. Every request is different. Each request wants different information and each one is very detail oriented. Either you have what they require or you don't. There are 3 requirements that are most prominent on all requests – available land (certified land), adequate and suitable infrastructure (water, sewer, roads, telecommunications) and a qualified workforce. We must all be aware of these needs and continue working together to increase, improve and make available these requirements.

During the year, we made eleven retention visits and eleven courtesy visits to our existing businesses and industries. Our existing businesses are our greatest asset! They are great corporate citizens and we are very proud and greatly appreciative of them.

You know, one thing we all have in common is we all want more job opportunities for our Region. It takes planning, preparation, hard work, self-determination, a positive attitude, lots of patience and sometimes just pure luck to create these new job opportunities. Unfortunately, they don't just happen because we have a nice community. The JREDC can't do it alone, it's a team effort, and we are ever grateful for our pro-business community leaders, investors and allies who support our efforts.





Morgan County








UNEMPLOYMENT 2011-2015

Morgan County








HOME SALES 2011-2015

Home Sales - Morgan and Scott County






MORGAN COUNTY ENTERPRISE ZONE 2011-2015




CITY OF JACKSONVILLE ENTERPRISE ZONE 2011-2015

BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT & ATTRACTION

Prospects

- Respond to all viable leads for new business development in a timely and professional manner.
- Host at least 3 site visits for prospective new business or industrial projects.
- Successfully recruit at least one new business into our region.

Entrepreneurship

- Continue to support, encourage and enhance the Morgan Scott CEO Program
- Continue to enhance and expand our partnership with the Jacksonville Area Chamber of Commerce, Jacksonville Main Street, Jacksonville Convention and Visitors Bureau, the Small Business Development Center and the local SCORE Chapter to encourage and help develop new business startups. Small business is the number one creator of new jobs.

Allies, Site Consultants & Corporate Realtors

- Conduct three multi-day call trips in Chicago and St. Louis
- Conduct an annual event to promote JREDC business location advantages to allies, consultants and realtors.

Ally Development

- Continue to expand our relationship with the Illinois Department of Commerce (IDOC) and meet at least twice each year with IDOC & Economic Development executives.
- Meet with economic development representatives from each utility which serves the JREDC region at least once.
- Meet with economic development representatives from all major railroads whose tracks service the JREDC territory at least once to discuss EDC activities and their marketing initiatives.

Target Marketing Program

- Develop and implement a basic media advertising campaign to promote the region's business advantages.
- Develop and print customized promotional materials targeted to each identified target segment.
- Annually conduct a targeted prospect development trip to prospects identified through allies or ad leads.

Formal Property Program

- Continue to develop and update pertinent information on LOIS regarding available sites and buildings.
- Identify and prepare informational brochures on at least four new sites each year.
- Identify and prepare informational brochures on at least two new buildings each year.
- Continue to diligently market our available existing industrial buildings.
- Development of one "Shovel Ready Site".
- Continue to develop and market Business Parks in Morgan and Scott Counties.

HAROLD COX INDUSTRY OF THE YEAR



The Industry of the Year Award has been presented by the Existing Industry Committee of the JREDC since 1990, to honor the industry that exhibits outstanding business development and activity that enhances regional economic viability. It is by the examples of exemplary businesses in our region, like Illinois Electric Cooperative that the JREDC works to realize their mission for the benefit of all. We are proud to recognize and have selected Illinois Electric Cooperative as recipient of the 2015 Harold Cox Award for Industry of the Year.

Illinois Electric Cooperative was organized in May of 1936 to provide electric service to the surrounding rural areas. The first electric lines in the Cooperative's territory were energized in 1938. They energized 606 miles in Greene, Morgan, Pike and Scott Counties and served 675 members. Today, they have 14,000 accounts and have a 3,000 mile distribution system; which is roughly the size of Delaware and Rhode Island and provide both electricity and internet services! Their headquarters are centrally located in the heart of their service territory in Winchester, Illinois, serving members in the surrounding counties of Morgan, Pike, Scott, Greene, and Calhoun, with a few members located in outlying regions of Adams, Brown, Cass, Jersey, and Macoupin counties.

TECHNOLOGY, PRODUCTS AND SERVICES

Illinois Electric Cooperative continues to be a leader in bringing the newest technology and renewable energy sources to the region. In 2005, the Cooperative developed the region's first wind turbine. In 2013, they developed the region's first utility scale solar array to benefit its membership. In 2015, the Cooperative increased its wireless broadband speed and also launched high speed triple play fiber broadband systems in Winchester and Bluffs.

QUALITY IMPROVEMENTS

The Illinois Electric Cooperative continues to be one of the safest Cooperatives in America to work. They recently received top honors and were awarded the Best 3-Year Safety Award for their outstanding safety record. The award is sponsored annually by the Association of Illinois Electric Cooperatives. They are also active in the Safety/Supervisory Technical (SST) Conference which helps keep attendees up-to-date on changes to safety procedures and provides presenters for information on topics of importance to their positions at their electric cooperatives.

In addition, they continue to receive some of the highest customer service ratings from their annual survey of membership. The Cooperative places great emphasis on taking care of their members.



SERVICE TO THE COMMUNITY

Illinois Electric Cooperative is very involved in the communities it serves. Since 2000, their Member's Fund has donated \$555,000 to local organizations and charities. They invest in the region's economic development in a number of ways. Most recently, through a partnership with the Jacksonville Regional Economic Development Corporation, they were a co-founder in the Morgan-Scott CEO Program which is in its 2nd year and offers the opportunity for local youth to start a business and fosters entrepreneurship. The program will soon be available to all students in their service territory. They also support the United Way, YMCA's and hospitals, but, their main investments are predominately in schools and education.

PROBLEM SOLVING

Illinois Electric Cooperative saw a need for rural industrial and business growth and as a result, offer support through the USDA's Rural Economic Development Loan & Grant program (REDLG) to spur economic development in the region. They also invest in local CDC's and industrial sites to further encourage and boost development in our rural communities. When no high speed internet service was readily available, after much planning, the Cooperative was able to provide high speed internet to rural residents in Winchester and Bluffs. They have supported the local higher education facilities and its students with internships which provide them experience and additional education in engineering and computer science which increases the potential to have a full time job upon graduation - and provides the Cooperative with experienced employees! The creation of electricity itself saved lives and greatly improved the quality of life in the rural area, especially for housewives, where electric lamps replaced oil, electric machines versus manual just made life easier! As they have always done and continue to do, the Cooperative strives to bring and keep our rural residents fully participating in the 21st century.

TEAMWORK

At Illinois Electric Cooperative, management and employees make a great team because they all place a priority on taking care of one another. They believe that in any successful organization or community, the members all understand the necessity and importance of taking care of each other.

GREAT PLACE TO WORK

The employees all agree the Cooperative is a great place to work because all share a commitment to its mission. Improving the quality of life in communities they serve either through the delivery of electric service, internet or economic development. Every day is focused on the best interest of their membership. They also enjoy working together, as they are a talented and diverse group of individuals from across their territory.

We are very fortunate to have such a valuable asset and stakeholder in our Region like Illinois Electric Cooperative. Their investment and innovative projects has been representative of what economic development in our Region is all about! We appreciate and thank you for all you do for our region. Congratulations!
